APA's aged care advocacy position hits the right note in the sector

APA's strategic advocacy to improve access to physiotherapy for older Australians is gaining recognition in the sector.

This week our response to final proposed recommendations to the Aged Care Royal Commission has been featured on respected news website *Australian Ageing Agenda*.

The widely read publication interviewed APA Director and gerontology physiotherapist Rik Dawson about the proposed recommendations, which were made in a final report by the Counsel Assisting to the Royal Commission.

The Commissioners will consider these proposals before handing down their final recommendations to the Federal Government next year. It is pleasing to see a number of recommendations echoing the principles we have long advocated for.

The Australian Ageing Agenda feature follows acknowledgement of the quality of our submissions from the office of the Counsels Assisting the Royal Commissioners.


The APA will make a final submission to the Royal Commission by 12 November 2020.

#### Aged care



Final proposed recommendations have been made by Counsel Assisting to the Aged Care Royal Commission in a wide-ranging report that recognises the importance of physiotherapy.

The APA broadly supports the Counsel Assisting's proposed recommendations that residential aged care facilities engage allied health professionals via a blended funding model of ongoing and activity-based payments. It also supports the monitoring of allied health services delivered to ensure consumers receive the level of multidisciplinary care they need.

Recommendations to ensure allied health representation in care management and in aged care health assessments via Medicare are also positive.

The APA publicly responded to the report with a media release. As a result, physiotherapy's vital role in aged care was featured in highly respected news website the *Australian Ageing Agenda*, which is widely read across the sector.

#### Serious Incident Response Scheme

The new Serious Incident Response Scheme (SIRS) will start in early 2021 as announced by Minister Richard Colbeck on 1 October 2020.

The department has published a SIRS Model for Implementation paper on its website. This paper sets out the structure and operation of the SIRS for residential aged care and flexible care delivered in a residential aged care setting.

The Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission will shortly provide the sector with information and education to ensure aged care providers are ready for commencement of the SIRS.

#### Compensables

The APA met with SIRA this week to discuss the evaluation of certification by physiotherapists and possible changes to the fee schedules in the near future.

The SIRA evaluation will be undertaken by the same Monash University team that undertook the evaluation of certification in the early days of Worksafe and TAC in Victoria. We encourage any members working with patients covered by SIRA to complete the evaluation.

The survey is hoping to capture opinions from all treating physiotherapists regarding certification whether you have actually issued a certificate or not.

We have no further details about how to participate at this stage but will keep you updated.

#### COVID-19

The APA and AHPA have strongly advocated on behalf of the physiotherapy profession and allied health to ensure continuity of safe practice via telehealth and face-to-face since the onset of COVID-19.

We are in continued regular contact with State Chief Allied Health Officers, the Minister for Health and relevant departments.

It is pleasingly we are moving to a "new normal" across the country and will keep you updated of changes as they happen.

#### **Border Updates**

Queensland has further eased border restrictions with New South Wales with an opening of the borders to regional New South Wales. However, travel is not permitted from the 32 greater Sydney Local Government Areas listed as hotspots.

#### Victoria Groups and Classes

Indoor group therapy will be permitted from 11:59pm on 8 November 2020. The following guidance has been provided by the Chief Allied Health Officer to support business planning:

- For clinical settings, indoor groups will need to apply a density quotient of 1 person per 4 square metres, with a patron cap of up to 10 people per space – practitioners are excluded from the group numbers.
- For health professionals, that provide clinical services in a fitness industry setting (ie. public/commercial gym) a density quotient of 1 person per 8 square metres with a patron cap of up to 10 people applies – practitioners are again excluded from the group numbers.
- 3. No shared equipment.
- 4. Stagger session times to avoid congregation or exceeding patron limits.
- 5. There will be no restrictions on the clinical indications for metro Melbourne or regional Victoria after 8 November 2020.

#### PPE in NSW aged care facilities

NSW Health has updated its guidance to residential aged care facilities. This includes advice that masks are no longer necessary in all aged care facilities.

NSW Health also recommends providers plan for all staff to wear surgical masks should it be recommended in the future where there is an increased risk of local transmission.

Minister Robert has announced the allocation of \$5.9 million over the next two years to the National Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Organisation (NACCHO) to strengthen NDIS services within Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities.

#### Disability and NDIS Projects

The APA met again last week with senior NDIA officials regarding concerns relating to the scope and timelines of the Independent Assessor (IA) project that was due for roll-out at the start of October. The NDIA have confirmed that the second pilot has recommenced and that the timelines for the national roll-out have been extended, and is now planned for February 2021.

Ongoing discussions with the NDIA will continue to address concerns raised by the APA including appropriateness of assessment tools, selection of tools and the scope of IA in plan development and review.

#### JMF grant

Content development for the online modules for the JMF grant are undergoing final testing. The course should be publicly available mid-November. Expressions of interest have been circulated and there has been great interest in the course. You can find more information or register.

#### **Paediatrics**

Ongoing discussions between the APA and AHPA have considered ongoing advocacy opportunities in the ECEI space. Next week the APA will meet with AHPA and other peak bodies to brainstorm future advocacy opportunities and approaches.

10-year Primary Healthcare Steering Committee

The APA is represented at the Primary Healthcare steering committee, which will help to improve patient-centered care, the quality of care, the efficiency and effectiveness of the health system. The next meeting of the steering committee is on 13 November 2020.

#### Telehealth

The APA continues to advocate for: an extension of MBS and DVA funded telehealth to enable current research into the effectiveness of telehealth to be concluded and further research to be undertaken to inform future decisions.

A commitment to ensuring that telehealth service delivery is safe and effective, and call for an evidence-based approach to underpin permanent access to telehealth for consumers. The next APA telehealth roundtable will occur on 12 November 2020 with attendees including a range of external stakeholders involved in future decision making about access to telehealth.

The topics that will be covered include:

- funding and sustainable support for telehealth for improved access and outcomes
- ensuring safety and quality of telehealth delivery within allied health professions
- updates from the aged care and remote and rural settings



 background and expected timeframes from the Melbourne University project on international standards for telehealth.
